<u>ALL SOULS DAY</u>: (Not to be confused with *Halloween* – Evening of *All Saints Day*) The Catechism of the Catholic Church defines purgatory as "the final purification of the elect, which is entirely different from the punishment of the damned." (CCC 1031) The following Biblical passages provide a biblical foundation for the belief in purgatory:

2 Maccabees 12:46 After a battle, Judas Maccabeus offers prayers and sacrifices for the fallen soldiers who had sinned, "that they might be delivered from their sin." This implies that the dead could still benefit from prayers and that purification was possible after death. 1Corinthians 3:13-15: St. Paul. This passage is often interpreted as referring to a process of purification, where the soul is cleansed of lesser sins or attachments after death but before entering heaven. Matthew 12:32: Jesus mentions that certain sins "will not be forgiven, either in this age or in the age to come," implying that some form of forgiveness or purification can occur after death.

Our Catholic celebration centres on the understanding that when they die, most people had not yet attained full holiness and moral perfection, the state of those who enter heaven. Through a process of spiritual purification their imperfections needed to be removed so that they attained the capacity to be filled with the love of God. **This sanctification is carried out posthumously in Purgatory – hence the name.** It is a beautiful insight into the mercy of God.


The custom of setting apart a special day for intercession for "the faithful departed" on November 2 was first established by St. Odilo (d. 1048) at his famous Benedictine abbey of Cluny in 998 in France. From Cluny the custom spread to the other houses of the Cluniac order, which became the largest and most extensive network of monasteries in Europe. The celebration was soon adopted in several dioceses in France and spread throughout the Western Church. It was accepted in Rome only in the fourteenth century. While 2 November remained the liturgical celebration, in time the entire month of November became associated in the Western Catholic tradition with prayer for the departed; lists of names of those to be remembered being placed in the proximity of the altar on which the sacrifice of the mass is offered.

Folklore: The origins of All Souls' Day in European folklore and folk belief are probably related to customs of ancestor veneration practised worldwide, seen in such events as the Chinese Ghost Festival, the Japanese Bon Festival, or the Mexican Day of the dead. Envelopes for November Masses are available in the Church entrances and Shrine of Our Lady. PHMSC

REPORT ON THE FIRST SESSION OF THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF THE SYNOD ON SYNODALITY CONCLUDING FOUR WEEKS OF MEETINGS IS PUBLISHED PART II – CONTINUED FROM LAST WEEK.

Commitment of believers in the field of politics and for the common good: In this sense, the Church is urged to be committed both to the "public denunciation of the injustices" perpetrated by individuals, governments, and companies; and to active engagement in politics, associations, trade unions... At the same time, the consolidated action of the Church in the fields of education, health, and social assistance, "without any discrimination or the exclusion of anyone", must not be neglected.

Migrants and refugees: "many of whom bear the wounds of uprooting, war and violence". They "often become a source of renewal and enrichment for the communities that welcome them and an opportunity to establish direct links with geographically distant churches". Faced with increasingly hostile attitudes towards them, "We are called to practice an open welcome, to accompany them in the construction of a new life and to build a true intercultural communion among peoples". Fundamental in this sense is "respect for the liturgical traditions and religious practices of migrants" as well as respect for their own language. "Evangelising in these contexts requires acknowledging mistakes made (in the "mission" of the Church to new areas of evangelisation), learning a new sensitivity to these issues."

Combating racism and xenophobia: "especially through pastoral formation". It is also urgent to identify "systems within the Church that create or maintain racial injustice".

Eastern Churches: the Report looks to Eastern Europe and the recent conflicts that have caused the flow of numerous faithful from the Catholic East into territories with a Latin majority. It is necessary "for the local Latin-rite Churches, in the name of Synodality, to help the Eastern faithful who have emigrated to preserve their identity and cultivate their specific heritage, without undergoing processes of assimilation."

On the road to Christian unity: among other items, "Christians of different affiliations who give their lives for faith in Jesus Christ" led to a proposal for an ecumenical martyrology.

Laity and families: "Laymen and laywomen, those in consecrated life, and ordained ministers have equal dignity": this conviction is forcefully reiterated in the Synthesis Report, which recalls how the lay faithful are "increasingly present and active in their contributions and are "indispensable to the mission of the Church". The different charisms must therefore be "called forth, recognized and fully appreciated", and not be ignored, underutilized, or "clericalised".

Women in the life and mission of the Church: Women "cry out for justice in societies still marked by sexual violence, economic inequality and the tendency to treat them as objects", adding "Pastoral accompaniment and vigorous advocacy for women should go hand in hand".

Clericalism: Many women present "expressed deep gratitude for the work of priests and bishops", but "also spoke of a Church that wounds". "Clericalism, a chauvinist mentality, and inappropriate expressions of authority continue to scar the face of the Church and damage its communion". A "profound spiritual conversion is needed as the foundation for any effective structural change"; and the General Assembly noted that "we desire to promote a Church in which men and women dialogue together... without subordination, exclusion, and competition".

MINUTES OF BUILDING AND MAINTENANCE COMMITTEE, THURSDAY 24 OCTOBER

Present: Stephen Chiew, Fr Peter, Claude Khoury, Luis Valarezo.

Prayer to St Joseph, our patron and inspiration.

Agenda: Works required with a view to the <u>Centenary of the Opening of the Church</u> around November/December 2026. (Foundation Stone: 2nd May, 1926).

Completed Work: Parish Office Kitchenette and Cupboards; Hall foyer painting and floor covering; path around Church; mortar holes in bricks around sacristy area. (Thanks, John Reis).

Work in Process: Upgrade of AV; renewing and repairing external lights of the Church; painting of weathered Rosary Room windows; bannister for stairs to sacristy school side; replace door outside sacristy at the top of the stairs, school side.

Future work: prioritised: Three **stained glass windows** needing repair of lead and resetting glass, with external safety glass to be replaced or installed where it is absent. Two quotes are to be obtained from glaziers recommended by the Archdiocese.

Leaks in Church and sacristy causes to be ascertained; **Mortar** for entire Church to be surveyed and **repairs of broken or weathered brick work**.

Structural Engineer to Report on cracking and sagging of the Office/Residence.

Choir Loft balustrade height to be raised.

Some work may require fund raising. PHMSC
