Continuing on with some fairly random information about the Churches Pope Francis is visiting: This week: The Church in Papua New Guinea (PNG)

PNG was the first overseas (from France) major Missionary area for the MSC-OLSH.

About 95% of the PNG are Christians, who are predominantly Protestants. Catholics make up almost 32%. In a country with over 800 different languages, rugged interiors, remote islands, tropical heat and humidity, diseases such as Malaria, and at times staunch resistance from local people, all posed enormous issues for early missionaries from Europe.


The first record of Catholic Mass in the PNG area, probably Sideia Island, was in 1606 by a chaplain to Torres' expedition. This was not a permanent mission. 240 years later an Italian missionary Fr Mazzucconi arrived and was martyred on Woodlark Island in 1845. That same year Marist Bishop Epalle, seven priests and seven brothers arrived from France in the South Solomons to begin the evangelization of Melanesia. The locals bashed them and Bishop Epalle died three days later of his wounds. The missionaries withdrew. In 1847 a new set of missionaries arrived on Woodlark and Rooke Islands. Many of them died of malaria so the Marists were forced to withdraw again. They were replaced by the Foreign Missionaries of Milan in 1852, also on Woodlark Island. They failed because of illness and resistance from the locals. In 1880, a French diocesan priest, Fr Lannuzel arrived in New Ireland as a chaplain to a lay French community. He baptized some children near Rabaul but left the Island with the failure of the French community.

The next to arrive were three MSC who started a mission in Matupit Island, near Rabaul, New Britain, in 1882, and in 1885 MSCs began on Yule Island off Papua. Bishop Couppé had success in New Britain and acted against the indigenous slave trade. Four German MSC and one Cistercian, together with five German MSC Sisters were killed in the Baining region of New Britain in 1904, leading to reprisals by the German colonial authorities. German Divine Word Missionaries (SVD) arrived in New Guinea in 1896 and established flourishing ministries. They opened a university in 1996. Marists resumed their interrupted mission in Melanesia in 1897 in what today are the Solomon Islands.

Each of these male religious orders had large numbers of associated missionary Sisters who accompanied their ministries and established education, health care, and social welfare. Without the Sisters the missions would not have flourished. MSC-OLSH missionaries experienced great difficulties with many dying from ill health not long after arrival. In time, and with persistence, however, the missions flourished and expanded. World War II saw many local Catholics and missionaries suffer imprisonment and death at the hands of the Japanese invaders. Forty-five SVD and Holy Spirit Sisters were massacred on the Japanese destroyer Akikaze in 1943. Over 300 mainly MSC and OLSH missionaries were confined to the Vunapope Mission near Rabaul, which was turned into a prison camp, and later at Ramale Valley. At both locations they lived in tunnels they dug into the hills to escape Allied bombing during the War. All told around 160 missionaries died during the war in the Pacific region. I have written previously about Peter To Rot, a catechist from near Rabaul and his martyrdom in 1945 at the hands of the occupying forces. "The catechist is the middle person who understands the local culture and the people. And the missionary always dialogues with the catechist. They were the first to go into the interior of present-day PNG which was full of difficult terrain. In time the missionaries established churches, roads, bridges, schools, hospitals, and other infrastructure" stated Bishop Tatamai.

Bishop Alain de Boismenu, (1908 to 1945) established missionary and charitable activities based on the mission at Yule Island. He was assisted by Filipino catechists. In 1918 he founded an indigenous order of nuns, the Handmaids of the Lord, which is still active. The French mystic and visionary Marie-Thérèse Noblet accompanied him to Papua and assisted at the mission until her death in 1930. The Sisters grew rapidly under her charismatic leadership. The first indigenous priest and bishop from Papua New Guinea was Louis Vangeke, MSC. He did his seminary studies in Madagascar and was ordained a priest in 1937.A Marist mission on Bougainville, flourished too, but the Japanese occupation caused major disruption, including the presumed execution of three Marist Brothers by the Japanese.

In 1967 the Australian ophthalmologist, Fr Frank Flynn MSC, was appointed as Administrator of the Cathedral and Director of Catholic Health Services in PNG. His efforts led to the foundation of a Medical Faculty at the University of Papua New Guinea. The mission hospitals developed into Catholic Church Health Services, which in 2016 ran five rural hospitals and one city hospital together with 244 health facilities. 70% of Papuan schools are run by Christian Churches, and 3,000 of them are Catholic. OLSH Sisters, MSCs, De La Salle and others founded these schools and Teachers' Colleges. John Ribat MSC, the Archbishop of Port Moresby since 2008, was created the first cardinal from Papua New Guinea in 2016. Social issues of current concern to the Church include domestic violence, sorcery and climate change. PNG is one of the states most affected by climate change and the consequent rise in sea levels particularly in the Manam and Cartaret islands.

The Church organizes activities aimed at preventing **drug-addiction**, **youth crime and the phenomenon of street children linked to early pregnancies**. The Church is a voice for **refugees and asylum seekers**, and of local indigenous peoples threatened by the activities **of extractive industries**. Bishops have **opposed the death penalty**, which was reintroduced in 2013, and against the rampant scourge of **human trafficking**.

Christianity is not the state religion. In recent years, the Catholic Church has opposed a proposal by some Evangelical groups to amend the Constitution to establish the Holy Trinity as the source of political authority, renaming the country as the "Independent and Christian State of Papua New Guinea". According to the Catholic bishops, however, the amendments would change the nature of the state, making PNG a confessional country in contrast with the cultural and religious diversity that has always characterized their society.




