A YOUNG SAINT FOR ALL SAINTS DAY

Blessed Carlo Acutis - died aged 15 from Leukemia.

There are lives that flow, seemingly normal. And then there are **exceptional** lives. What is most surprising about Carlo's story is how he managed to be profoundly original: offering everyone who knew him the portrait of an exceptionally **smiling normality**. One of his sayings: "We're born original, but too often end up as photocopies." (i.e. we lose our originality under the name of personal freedom, but in fact blend, uncritically, into society and its values."

Carlo Acutis was born May 3, 1991, in London, where his father was working. Just a few months later, he moved with his parents, Andrea Acutis and Antonia Salzano, to Milan, Italy.

From a young age, Carlo had a special love for God, even though his parents weren't especially devout. His mother said that before Carlo was born, she went to Mass only for her first Communion, her confirmation, and her wedding. But as a young child, Carlo loved to pray the rosary. After he made his first Communion, he went to Mass as often as possible. His love for the Eucharist also inspired a deep conversion for his mother. The biographer said he "managed to drag his relatives, his parents to Mass every day. It was not the other way around; it was not his parents bringing the little boy to Mass, but it was he who managed to get himself to Mass and to convince others to receive Communion daily. He said to his mother: "There are queues in front of a concert, in front of a football match, but I don't see these queues in front of the Blessed Sacrament' ... So, for him the Eucharist was the centre of his life."

Carlo, as a little boy, taught a man who helped in the house how to pray the rosary and told him about the real presence of Christ in the Eucharist. The helper said that one of the things that most impressed him as a non-Christian was the witness of Carlo's love and concern for the poor — how he interacted with the homeless man who would sit at the entrance of the church and would bring tupperware dishes filled with food out to people living on the streets.

Carlo wasn't afraid to defend Church teaching, even in situations when his classmates - in a Catholic High School - disagreed with him. Many of them remember Carlo giving a passionate defence for the protection of life from the moment of conception when there was a classroom discussion about abortion.

He was known for **standing up for kids at school who got bullied, especially kids with disabilities.** When a friend's parents were getting a divorce, Carlo made a special effort to **include his friend** in the Acutis' family life. He loved soccer and mountain climbing.

He was **fascinated with computer coding** and taught himself some of the basic coding languages, including C and C++. He used his computer skills and internet savvy to help his family put together an **exhibition on Eucharistic miracles** that has gone on to be displayed at thousands of parishes on five continents. He liked Nintendo, GameCube, PlayStation and Xbox, Spider-Man and Pokémon. **He limited his video game playing to no more than two hours per week.**

Carlo was diagnosed with leukemia a few months before his death in October 2006 at the age of 15. He stated: "I offer all of my suffering to the Lord for the pope and for the Church..." At his request, he was buried in Assisi. Initially, there were reports that Carlo's body was found to be incorrupt, but the <u>bishop of Assisi clarified before his beatification that his body was not incorrupt.</u> Blessed (soon to be Saint) Carlo Acutis pray for us, especially for our youth. 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Synod in Rome: Final Report (Taken from *Catholic World News Service*)

In a significant departure from previous synods, Pope Francis, rather than writing his own "Report" as an Exhortation, has simply endorsed the assembly's conclusions. It is comprised of a 52-page document, approved by 355 synod members.

Key Developments: The document emerges from a two-year consultative process that began in 2021. Compared to its 2023 predecessor, the text presents more concrete recommendations and clearer structural guidelines.

Structural Reforms: Among the most significant proposals is a call for strengthening pastoral councils at parish and diocesan levels. The document advocates for regular ecclesiastical assemblies across all Church levels — including continental —and heightened ecumenical dialogue. The text introduces the concept of synodal authority while acknowledging that in "a synodal Church, the authority of the Bishop, of the Episcopal College and of the Bishop of Rome in regard to decision-taking is inviolable." "Such an exercise of authority, however, is not without limits," the document adds. On this view, the Report calls for a revision in canon law, "clarifying the distinction and relation between consultation and deliberation and shedding light on the responsibilities of those who play different roles in the decision-making process."

Women's Leadership: The document explicitly states there is "no reason or impediment" to prevent women from assuming leadership roles in the Church. Furthermore, "the question of women's access to diaconal ministry remains open," and that discernment should continue. The text advocates for increased female participation in clergy formation and broader involvement in Church decision-making processes.

Lay Participation: The document significantly expands the role of lay faithful in Church governance. It calls for their increased presence in synodal assemblies and all phases of ecclesiastical decision-making. New procedures for selecting and evaluating bishops and expanded lay participation in diocesan leadership and canonical processes are proposed.

Implementation Phase: While Pope Francis has declared the synodal path "completed," the document emphasizes that a crucial implementation phase lies ahead. This next stage will focus on integrating Synodality as a "constitutive dimension of the Church." The text also addresses accountability measures, calling for enhanced financial transparency and protocols for abuse prevention, declaring: "The need within the Church for healing, reconciliation and the rebuilding of trust has resounded at every stage of the synodal process."

Background: The document represents the culmination of one of the most extensive consultative processes in Church history, building on both the 2023 assembly's work and the broader synodal journey initiated by Pope Francis in 2021. The exercise aimed to balance traditional Church teaching with contemporary pastoral needs while promoting greater inclusivity and transparency in Church governance.
